Christianity in the Celtic Tradition: Spirituality for Today Sept. 18 - Nov. 20, 2008

Beginning with Contemplative Prayer, each session will focus on the major aspects of early Celtic Christianity as a model for faith in the 21st Century. The session will end at 5 p.m. A free will offering will be taken at each session. A person may join any time during the classes.

Christianity and the Transforming Power of Prayer Jan. 22- Apr. 30, 2009

Each session will focus on the Mystical Theology of the early church. If you desire more in your practice of prayer, this class will guide you. The class will focus on the mystical teaching of the early Church. The session will end at 5:30 p.m.. A free will offering will be taken at each weekly class. A person may join the class at any time.

All classes are taught by **The Rev. Dr. Jerry C. Doherty**. Fr. Doherty has been a priest since 1975 and served parishes for 32 years. He began as chaplain at the UEC in 2008. A Celtic scholar, he is the author of *The Celtic Model of Ministry: The Reawakening of Community Spirituality*.
